

### Person-Centeredness of Research (PCoR) Scale Scoring

Each item of the scale has a 5-point range from strongly disagree (-2) to strongly agree (2).

After scoring each item, all items should be added for a final score.

For the 7-item scale, the lowest possible score is -14 (least person-centered) and the highest possible score is 14 (most person-centered).
